EXPLORING NEXT SUNDAY'S THEME

Reflecting on the Gospel

The way, the truth and the life (John 14: 1-14)

This passage from John's Gospel is part of the Farewell Discourse after Jesus' last supper with his disciples. Judas has just left the meal. As part of this discourse, Jesus refers to himself as 'the way'. The image of the journey is of great importance in John's Gospel, right from chapter one when the first disciple followed Jesus to see where Jesus was staying. Now in the present passage John shows how the journey itself is of greater significance than the destination. Jesus takes to himself the description 'I am the way.' Subsequent generations of Christians have known themselves as people of the way.

Our image to stimulate reflection on this passage where Jesus says 'I am the way' is maps.

Extracts from the Gospel passage (John 14: 5-7)

Thomas said to him,
'Lord, we do not know where you are going.
How can we know the way?'
Jesus said to him,
'I am the way, and the truth, and the life.
No one comes to the Father except through me.
If you know me, you will know my Father also.
From now on you do know him and have seen him.'

Gospel prayer

Risen Lord, you are the way, the truth and the life. Keep us firm in your way, that we may hold to your truth and share in your risen life; now and always. Amen.

ENGAGING WITH THE THEME AT HOME

Reflecting and meditating

Reflect on Jesus' teaching about the future. Judas has now left the last supper and the events of the betrayal, trial, and crucifixion have been triggered:

- > what details in the passage catch your attention?
- what big ideas does the passage spark in your mind?
- > what most touches your heart in the passage?
- > what most stretches your mind and makes you think in the passage?

Thinking and talking

- what do you understand by the journey on which Jesus is soon to embark?
- how do you read Thomas' question, 'How can we know the way?'?
- what do you make of Jesus' answer, 'I am the way'?
- how do you read, 'No one comes to the father except through me'?
- what does this narrative say for us today?

Using your Bible

The Farewell Discourse that John places after the conclusion of the last supper occupies the whole of chapters 14 to 17. Explore how the theme of journey has been introduced earlier in John's Gospel and persists through the Farewell Discourse:

> John 8: 21-22

> John 12: 26

> John 16: 2

Explore images of the way in the Old Testament:

> Psalm 1: 1

> Psalm 119: 25-32

Exploring online

- > explore 'I am the way images'
- > explore electronic maps of your own area
- > explore cartography and map making
- > explore pointing hand symbols

Drawing on experience

- > what is your experience of maps?
- > what has pointed you on the path with Jesus?
- > what is your experience of Jesus being the way for you?

Creating and making

- > make signs in the shape of a pointing hand or of a signpost to place in your window, saying 'Jesus said, "I am the way""
- > make a three dimensional map of your local area: 'We use maps to show us the way'
- make a collage of the resources that keep us on the way with Jesus around a signpost: Jesus the way
- Create a reflection, poem, or prayer on Jesus the way
