EXPLORING NEXT SUNDAY'S THEME

Reflecting on the Gospel

Commissioning the twelve disciples (Matthew 9: 35 to 10:8)

The Synoptic Gospels show Jesus as working closely with a group of twelve special disciples. The number of special disciples reflects the twelve tribes of Israel and so foreshadows the new Israel founded by Jesus. In chapter 4 Matthew has introduced the first four disciples, Peter and Andrew, James and John. Then, after the sermon on the mount and a series of healings Matthew records the call of the fifth disciple, known in this Gospel as Matthew but as Levi in Mark's Gospel. Now for the first time all twelve disciples are named.

Our image to stimulate reflection on this passage is *friends*.

Extracts from the Gospel passage (Matthew 1: 1-4)

Then Jesus summoned his twelve disciples and gave them authority over unclean spirits, to cast them out, and to cure every disease and every sickness. These are the names of the twelve apostles: first, Simon, also known as Peter, and his brother Andrew; James son of Zebedee, and his brother John; Philip and Bartholomew; Thomas and Matthew the tax-collector; James son of Alphaeus, and Thaddaeus; Simon the Cananaean, and Judas Iscariot, the one who betrayed him.

Gospel prayer

Lord Jesus Christ, you chose twelve disciples to be your close followers. Call us to follow in their footsteps, that we may share their closeness to you; for you are our God. Amen.

ENGAGING WITH THE THEME AT HOME

Reflecting and meditating

Reflect on Matthew's teaching concerning Jesus' commissioning of the disciples in Matthew 9: 35-10: 8:

- > what details in the passage catch your attention?
- what big ideas does the passage spark in your mind?
- > what most touches your heart in the passage?
- > what most stretches your mind and makes you think in the passage?

Thinking and talking

- how do you read the context into which Matthew places the commission of the twelve (9: 35-38)?
- how do you read the task given to the twelve (10: 1)?
- what do you make of Jesus' choice of these twelve (10: 2-4)?
- **>** how helpful do you find the image of *friends* for interpreting this passage?
- > what does this narrative say for us today?

Using your Bible

Explore how the commissioning of the twelve is handled in Mark and Luke:

Mark 6: 6-13Luke 9: 1-6Luke 10: 1-16

Explore the twelve tribes in the Old Testament:

Genesis 49: 28Numbers 2

Exploring online

Drawing on experience

- reflect on what real friendship has meant to you
- reflect on the friends you have stayed in touch with over time and why

- > make a collage of Jesus' twelve disciples and place yourself among them
- > select one disciple, describe his qualities and place his picture in your home
- place images of the twelve disciples alongside pictures of your church/cathedral, linking past and present
- create a reflection, poem or prayer on the theme of friendship
