EXPLORING NEXT SUNDAY'S THEME

Reflecting on the Gospel

Jesus foretells his death and resurrection to his disciples (Mark 8: 31-38)

In Mark's Gospel Jesus begins to teach his disciples about his forthcoming crucifixion as soon as Peter has publicly acknowledged him as the Christ at Caesarea Philippi in the verses immediately preceding this passage. There are two other predictions of the crucifixion later in Mark's Gospel, each becoming more explicit and precise. On this first occasion the disciples fail to understand and the crowds are invited to take up their cross and to follow him.

Our image to stimulate reflection on this passage is the cross.

Extracts from the Gospel passage (Mark 8: 34-35)

He called the crowd with his disciples, and said to them, If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake, and for the sake of the gospel, will save it.

Gospel prayer

Lord Jesus Christ, you suffered for our salvation. Help us to take up the cross, and to follow you; for you are our God. Amen.

READING NEXT SUNDAY'S GOSPEL

Mark 8: 31-38

Jesus Foretells His Death and Resurrection

Then he began to teach them that the Son of Man must undergo great suffering, and be rejected by the elders, the chief priests, and the scribes, and be killed, and after three days rise again. He said all this quite openly. And Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him. But turning and looking at his disciples, he rebuked Peter and said, 'Get behind me, Satan! For you are setting your mind not on divine things but on human things.'

He called the crowd with his disciples, and said to them, 'If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake, and for the sake of the gospel, will save it. For what will it profit them to gain the whole world and forfeit their life? Indeed, what can they give in return for their life? Those who are ashamed of me and of my words in this adulterous and sinful generation, of them the Son of Man will also be ashamed when he comes in the glory of his Father with the holy angels.'

ENGAGING WITH THE THEME AT HOME

Reflecting and meditating

Reflect on how Jesus foretells his death and resurrection to his disciples (Mark 8: 31-38):

- > what details in the passage catch your attention?
- what big ideas does the passage spark in your mind?
- > what most touches your heart in the passage?
- what most stretches your mind and makes you think in the passage?

Thinking and talking

- how do you read Jesus teaching about his death immediately after Peter has confessed him as the Christ?
- > what do you make of Jesus' rebuke directed to Peter?
- how do you understand Jesus' invitation to others to pick up their cross?
- > what is the cost of discipleship implied in this teaching?
- how can we best understand this teaching for today?

Using your Bible

Explore Mark's other two predictions of Jesus' death and resurrection:

- Mark 9: 30-32
- Mark 10: 32-34

Explore how Matthew and Luke make subtle changes to Mark's first prediction:

- Matthew 16: 21-27
- ▶ Luke 9: 22-26

Explore a major chapter in the Old Testament that has been linked to the idea of a suffering Messiah:

Isaiah 53

Exploring online

- > explore the three predictions of the Passion in Mark's Gospel
- explore different images of the cross
- explore Christian cross variants

Drawing on experience

- reflect on your experiences of waiting before the cross
- reflect on your experiences of carrying your cross
- > reflect on the different forms of crosses with which you are familiar

Creating and making

- make a poster of Jesus' sayings about his death and resurrection
 make a collage showing different types of Christian crosses

- make crosses to display in your home
 create a reflection, poem, or prayer on the cross
