EXPLORING CHRISTMAS DAY'S THEME

Reflecting on the Gospel

Nativity (Luke 2: 1-14)

Luke's account of the nativity speaks of Mary and Joseph's journey to Bethlehem, of there being no room in the inn, and of Jesus being placed in a manger. Luke also gives prominence to the shepherds. The birth of Jesus went neither unnoticed nor uncelebrated, because the shepherds were there to pay homage. In the Christmas tradition the shepherds have come to represent the ordinary people of first century Palestine, people whose lives the Saviour was born to change.

Our image to stimulate reflection on this passage is the shepherds.

Extracts from the Gospel passage (Luke 2: 8-11)

In that region there were shepherds living in the fields, keeping watch over their flock by night. Then an angel of the Lord stood before them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified. But the angel said to them, 'Do not be afraid; for see – I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people: to you is born this day in the city of David a Saviour, who is the Messiah, the Lord.'

Gospel prayer

Lord Jesus Christ, the shepherds rejoiced at your birth. Accept the praise of our hearts, as we offer them to you in joy; now and always. Amen.

READING THE GOSPEL FOR CHRISTMAS DAY

Luke 2: 1-14

The Birth of Jesus

In those days a decree went out from Emperor Augustus that all the world should be registered. This was the first registration and was taken while Quirinius was governor of Syria. All went to their own towns to be registered. Joseph also went from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judea, to the city of David called Bethlehem, because he was descended from the house and family of David. He went to be registered with Mary, to whom he was engaged and who was expecting a child. While they were there, the time came for her to deliver her child. And she gave birth to her firstborn son and wrapped him in bands of cloth, and laid him in a manger, because there was no place for them in the inn.

The Shepherds and the Angels

In that region there were shepherds living in the fields, keeping watch over their flock by night. Then an angel of the Lord stood before them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified. But the angel said to them, 'Do not be afraid; for see — I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people: to you is born this day in the city of David a Saviour, who is the Messiah, the Lord. This will be a sign for you: you will find a child wrapped in bands of cloth and lying in a manger.' And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host, praising God and saying,

'Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace among those whom he favours!'

ENGAGING WITH THE THEME AT HOME

Reflecting and meditating

Reflect on Luke's account of the nativity (Luke 2: 1-14):

- > what details in the passage catch your attention?
- what big ideas does the passage spark in your mind?
- > what most touches your heart in the passage?
- > what most stretches your mind and makes you think in the passage?

Thinking and talking

- > what do you understand about the political context of the registration?
- what is the significance of Joseph going to Bethlehem?
- > what do you make of the place of the shepherds?
- ▹ how do you interpret the place of the manger?
- how can we best understand the narrative for today?

Explore passages in the Old Testament that resonate with Luke's account of the birth of Jesus:

- Psalm 148: 1-2
- ➢ Isaiah 7: 14
- ▶ Isaiah 9: 6
- Micah 5: 2-5

Exploring online

- explore shepherds and the birth of Jesus
- > explore classic art of the shepherds at Jesus' birth
- explore shepherds in the time of Jesus

Drawing on experience

- reflect on your experience of shepherds in today's world
- > reflect on your experience of shepherds in the nativity narrative
- reflect on occasions when you, like the shepherds, have been caught up in heavenly music

Creating and making

- > create a poster illustrating the shepherds keeping watch over their flock by night
- create a nativity scene with the shepherds coming to the manger
- create a collage of shepherds from Christmas cards
- create a reflection, poem, or prayer on the shepherds finding Jesus
